


Public Health Emergency Declared in British Columbia April 2016





Illicit Drug Overdose Deaths in BC 2007-2016



Research preliminary results

- Overdose is a common reality for people who use drugs.
- People are not calling emergency services
- People need more treatment options
- 2/3 used multiple substances simultaneously
- People need to be able to trust the service provider
- People are integrating harm reduction strategies Not using alone, doing testers, reducing dose, warning each other, checking on their friends, getting Naloxone kits and training.
- People want to learn more about the substances they are putting in their bodies



Technologies need to be able to:

- Detect and identify New Psychoactive Substances (NPS)
- Identify multiple ingredients in a given substance
- Pick up trace amounts of a substance in other substances
- Be mobile
- Affordable
- Fast results


